

IUGA International Symposium on Birth Trauma and Pelvic Floor Health for Allied Health Professionals Report

The first IUGA International Symposium on Birth Trauma and Pelvic Floor Health for Allied Health Professionals was held June 29-30, 2019 at Croydon University Hospital. There were 108 attendees, from 10 countries including 17 speakers and 6 Sponsors. There were 7 organizations who endorsed our program. Among the attendees, the majority were physiotherapists, but there were also nurses, midwives, physicians, fellows, and HCAs present. Through this meeting, we have made important steps towards truly working as a multi-disciplinary association.

There were 8 different workshops offered (see appendix A for full list), of which each attendee could participate in 4. All workshops were very well received.
