

The second IUGA International Symposium designed for Allied Health Professionals was entitled A Multidisciplinary Approach to the Prevention and Management of Pelvic Floor Dysfunction and was held virtually on March 13-14, 2021. The symposium had 603 attendees from 55 countries and 35 speakers. Of the 603 attendees, there were 300 physiotherapists, 206 doctors/physicians in training, 21 nurses, 30 midwives, and 1 physician assistant. The other attendees were researchers, HCAs, or lecturers.

We featured two keynote lectures, one by Prof. Jacqueline Dunkley-Bent, the head midwife of the UK, and Dr. John DeLancey. There were 3 presentations from patients, 3 roundtable sessions, and 11 plenary lectures followed by live question and answer sessions. There were 8 different workshops offered of which each attendee could participate in 2. All workshops were very well received and are available to watch on-demand. Please see appendix A for the full program.

We had 3 Sponsors and 9 Endorsing Organizations. There was a lunch sponsored session by Bulkamid which was attended live by 178 people. The afternoon sponsored session by Viomed was almost as successful with 146 live attendees. The Prometheus Group also purchased an insert in the virtual meeting bag.

We received 79 filled in evaluation forms and feedback from participants was overwhelmingly positive, with all respondents reporting that they were either extremely satisfied or satisfied with their overall experience and with the quality of the content. No one indicated that they were dissatisfied with any aspect of the program. The minimal negative feedback that was received centered around receiving login details late and a lack of networking opportunities, breaks, and CME points.

Through this symposium, we gained 148 paid new members. Of the 148, 93 are physiotherapists, 11 are nurses, 20 are midwives, 22 are doctor/physician in training, 1 is physician assistant and 1 is professor. As such, we have made important steps towards truly working as a multi-disciplinary association.

Preliminary results indicate a meeting profit of more than USD 11,600 and USD 11,100 in membership fees.

Recommendation

We had 603 delegates in 2021, as compared to 101 in 2019. IUGA also gained 148 new members through the 2021 symposium, as opposed to 2019 when the symposium helped us to gain 41 new members. As a virtual meeting, this symposium was both accessible and affordable for attendees around the world. It was also not limited by space or the size of the venue. Based on the success of this symposium, both in terms of financial benefit to IUGA and providing education and information to a broader audience, we would highly recommend continuing this as a virtual meeting on an annual basis.
