General Remarks

The IUGA-eXchange Pilot Workshop took place from 04-05/05/2005 in Midrand near Johannesburg, South Africa at the Company headquartes of Johnson & Johnson, SA. The final meeting-venue was changed after the preparatory meeting, as Johnson & Johnson SA provided the company's facilities at Midrand without charge. The Workshop went along smoothly without any difficulties; there was a course-dinner (held also at the facilities of and sponsored by J&J on 05/04/05) and some time for small talk between both faculties and the participants. The response of the participants overall appeared to be very positive.

Faculty

In the end there were 35 participants (gynecologists and urologists). Evaluation at the end of the workshop revealed that the educational needs of the participants were mostly met. Much positive feedback was also given in personal communications and many expressed the wish to have a follow-up event next year (this probably also holds true for those whose applications for the workshop could not be accepted). The overall impression of this pilot-project as judged by the members of both the South African and IUGA faculties in personal communications appeared to be mostly very positive.

Main Female Pelvic Health Issues in South Africa

The first two updates dealt with female pelvic health and public health issues in South Africa. It became clear that the most important health issues South Africa has to confront are poverty, HIV and AIDS, the latter being responsible for a significant decline in life expectancy. As a consequence urogynecology does not have a high priority in the context of South African gynecology. Due to the availability of obstetric care and cesarean sections the fistula problem appears not to be very prevalent in South Africa, although in remote rural areas this still could be a problem.

Educational Issues

Most participants expressed a strong desire to learn about the pelvic floor and function of the lower UGT. The formal evaluation and personal discussion showed a strong desire to learn about physiology, anatomy, function and in particular about surgical techniques – although these would probably be useful mostly in private medicine.


